


ANIMATOR RAY PATIN INTHE SHADOW OF THE SIGN His Life in Pictures




Introducing Ray


A view of Burbank 1924




Portrait of the artist as a budding cartoonist







WITNESSETH:


WHEREAS, First Party is engaged, among other things, in the production, manufacture, recording, photographing and/or making of animated motion picture sound cartoons, and

WHEREAS, Artist is desirous of continuing in the service and employ of First Party, and being further trained and developed in said art of motion picture cartoon production, and






