




It is his first genre painting and shows a scene of contemporary life, an image of mercenary love perhaps in a brothel. The woman in black, the leering coupler, in a nun's costume, could be the eponymous procuress, while the man to her right, wearing a black beret and a doublet with slashed sleeves, has been identified as a self-portrait of the artist.

Sherwood repositions the nude from the object of a male gaze to a reflection of disabled reality. Her work reveals how conceptions of a physical ideal might be remapped when our bodies cease to work the way they did, or even if they never worked that way to begin with.

In 1997, at the age of 44, she had a massive stroke – a cerebral hemorrhage—which paralyzed the right side of her body and affected her cognition and speech. Paintings from this period incorporated images of cerebral angiograms of her own brain and magical healing symbols. Sherwood said of her stroke that it was when "my life caught up to my art



Vittore Carpaccio Two Venetian Ladies 1490


The painting shows two unknown Venetian ladies. The painting was formerly considered to show two courtesans. Modern art historians think them more likely members to be of the patrician Torella family, as suggested by their fine clothes and the pearl necklaces, but academic debate continues, as with other similar Venetian paintings of the period.



Les Demoiselles d'Avignon 1907 by PP

It portrays five nude female prostitutes in a brothel on Carrer d'Avinyó, a street in Barcelona, Spain. Each figure is depicted in a disconcerting confrontational manner, and none is conventionally feminine. The women appear slightly menacing and are rendered with angular and disjointed body shapes. The far-left figure exhibits facial features and dress of Egyptian or southern Asian style. The two adjacent figures are shown in the Iberian style of Picasso's native Spain, while the two on the right are shown with African mask-like features. The ethnic primitivism evoked in these masks, according to Picasso, moved him to "liberate an utterly original artistic style of compelling, even savage force,





This iconic photograph shows 43 women in colorful clothing posing in 41 windows of a condemned brownstone building in Manhattan. Ormond Gigli was working in his studio on 58th Street, across the street from a group of brownstones that were about to be demolished. The windows had been removed and Gigli had an idea of photographing a group of women, one in each of the window openings, wearing formalwear.
