Novel and Upcoming Series

Somnyama Ngonyama (Hail the Dark Lioness)















Zanele Muholi's photographic series of digitally altered self-portraits "Somnyama Ngonyama" (translated by the artist as "Hail, the Dark Lioness") consists of carefully posed images taken in locations around the world, through which the artist-activist gives voice to a vast number of black South Africans, primarily LGBTQ, long relegated by dominant social institutions to the shadows and the depredations of violence.

Mickalene Thomas Born 1971 SFMOMA 2021







Qusuquzah, une très belle négresse 1, 2011. Confident and self-aware, the women Thomas depicts are powerful protagonists in control of how they are portrayed. This work is part of a series that considers little-known paintings of Black women by modern artists. The composition was inspired by Édouard Manet's La négresse (also known as Portrait of Laure, 1862), which was painted in preparation for the figure of the maid in his iconic Olympia (1863). Thomas obtained the subtitle from Manet's description of his subject. Rooted in her desire to represent Black women on their own terms, Thomas's portrait of Qusuquzah, who frequently models for the artist, celebrates the beauty of Black trans womanhood.



Van Gogh painted this woman while staying in the Carrel hotel in the southern French city of Arles. It is probably Elisabeth Garcin, the hotel owner's mother-in-law. She was 68 years old at the time. The knotted black kerchief on her head was a typical part of a widow's mourning dress. Part of a bed can be seen in the background.

Throughout his life, Van Gogh liked to paint things and people that bore the marks of a hard life. This figure study can be seen in that context.








The Woman At the Creation According to Michelangelo















Protest!



In 1914, suffragette Mary Richardson slashed at Velazquez's painting, then hanging at the National Gallery, London, with a meat cleaver. The suffragette slashed Velazquez's canvas, with a meat cleaver to protest the arrest of fellow suffragette Emmeline Pankhurst. As the feminist writer, Lynda Nead has said, "The incident has come to symbolize a particular perception of feminist attitudes towards the female nude ...". She suggests that the 1970s feminist claim to our bodies ourselves was not only a call to women to reclaim their rights over their bodies in the area of health, reproductive rights and sexuality, but also over the ways in which the female body is imaged and represented in the visual arts and culture. Modern female artists began to create works depicting women's bodies in reaction against "representations of the female body produced by the 'Old Master/Playboy tradition'."




Judy Chicago

The Dinner Party is a 1974-79 installation artwork by feminist artist Judy Chicago. Widely regarded as the first epic feminist artwork, it functions as a symbolic history of women in civilization. There are 39 elaborate place settings on a triangular table for 39 mythical and historical famous women.


















Bansky 2023

A somber Valentine's Day artwork created by the British street artist Banksy in the seaside town of Margate in the United Kingdom was partially removed today, just hours after it had appeared.

Valentine's Day Mascara features a stereotypical 1950s housewife with a swollen eye and a missing front tooth. The woman appears to be tossing a man into a discarded fridge freezer on site. The work could be seen as an attempt to raise awareness of the issue of domestic abuse on the occasion of Valentine's Day.




